President's Report

Your Board is pleased to provide this update in our Annual Report for the 2018/19 financial year. It has been a year with both positives and negatives for JOY.

Importantly, JOY remains the communications hub of the LGBTIQ communities, allowing our voices to be heard and our stories to be told. Our content has significant impact, and we now reach well over 500,000 listeners each month on both analogue and digital radio broadcast channels, and even more via our podcasts. There is something for every JOY listener, from our uplifting music mix on weekdays, to our specialist programming in the evenings and on the weekends. Thank you to everyone who is a part of making such great content that resonates so strongly with our listeners.

Running a radio station is an expensive undertaking and our financial result this past financial year has been incredibly disappointing. Sponsorships remained quite strong in an increasingly tough business environment, and membership incomes during Radiothon were also very positive. But we fell well short of our goals on other donations and fundraising, and this is a vital part of our income each year. We will need to work hard in the coming financial year to rebuild and broaden our revenue base to secure JOY's financial sustainability, having done what we must to reduce our cost base.

Our biggest opportunity and challenge ahead is our move to the Victorian Pride Centre. Pleasingly, we have received support from the Victorian Labor government via recurrent funding of \$200,000 per year for the next four years 2019-2022. This is a great start and will support us through the critical transition period prior to and following our expected relocation in the second half of 2020. But additional significant capital investment will be required to fit out the JOY broadcast operations in the VPC. Your Board and CEO are actively pursuing all opportunities to secure additional funding, as it's vital that we use this move to the VPC to future proof our technology and operations for the next phase of JOY's life as a vibrant community LGBTIQ organisation.

I'd like to thank everyone who has made a contribution to JOY this year - our members, patrons, sponsors, staff, volunteers and my fellow directors on the Board. Everyone who makes a contribution to JOY, in whatever way they can, makes a difference. Please continue to support JOY in the year ahead - this is a critical time in our history and we are always stronger working together towards a common goal.

Treasurer's Report

The financial year was difficult for JOY as we have unfortunately incurred an operating loss of \$124.5K. Our overall revenues for the year were comparable to that of 2018, being \$956.7K and \$955.6K respectively. Sponsorships performed well at \$498.7K, given the staff transitions in this area. Membership and donations were held at 2018 levels in an increasingly competitive space as other LGBTI community groups reach out for donations. JOY also received a significant bequest of \$54,400 from the estate of Mr Alan Pollard. Mr Pollard's generous bequest has been allocated to the special purpose fund held in our equity account. The other patron donations received during the year are listed on page 3 of the Annual Report. JOY wishes to thank all generous donors for their support during the year. JOY's grant income for the year was down on 2018, however grants are dependent on what is available in the market. Our fundraising incomes were down on 2018 but comparable to the 2017 result. JOY wishes to thank the ongoing support of our friends at Northside Bizarre who kindly donated \$11K in 2019. Concerning other revenues for 2019, we saw an increase in training revenues for the year, which is very positive.

Whilst our overall revenues for the year were comparable to 2018 our cost base, \$1.08M, for the year was above 2018 by 5% or \$53,400. Employee wage expenses were similar to 2018 at \$532.8K. Operating costs however were above 2018. Unfortunately, JOY had to absorb an extraordinary cost of \$40,000 that pertained to bad debts incurred from prior year sponsorship sales. JOY also absorbed increased technology maintenance and support costs as these services were outsourced to a third party supplier.

JOY's equity at 30 June 2019 is reported at \$215,776 (2018: \$340,315) which includes bequests and special purpose donations of \$66,995. Similarly, cash on hand at 30 June 2019 was \$200,416. JOY's current assets were \$314,480 at 30 June 2019 (2018: \$414,744) and JOY's non-current assets (technology, studio and office equipment) at 30 June 2019 have a depreciated asset value of \$71,843. JOY's current liabilities were \$170,547 at 30 June 2019 (2018: \$176,599).

Due to the two years of operating losses reported, the JOY board has already taken prudent steps to reduce the operating expenditures for the 2020 financial year and beyond. We have reduced the employee headcount providing a cost saving of some \$75K compared to 2019. Further, a review of JOY's technology equipment leases and IT support contracts are currently being performed and we are confident that savings will be realised. This review of JOY's technology infrastructure is to identify areas to minimise the cost of ownership, obsolescence and risk of failure and to ensure JOY's readiness for its move to the Victoria Pride Centre.

Whilst the 2019 financial year was difficult, members can be reassured that the board is focused on the financial stability of JOY. Our new CEO, Ange Barry, together with the JOY staff are working extremely hard to create a dynamic, efficient and sustainable resourcing model coupled with robust commercial management. The board and management will continue with their ongoing efforts to identify cost reduction opportunities and these will be applied to the operating budget when they arise.

I would like to thank our previous Treasurer, Ian Graystone, for his efforts and a special thank you to the members of the Finance, Audit and Risk Committee and the rest of the board for their support.



This award goes to **Bent Notes**

The award reflects the significant and ongoing contribution that Bent Notes has made to the quality and diversity of the JOY on-air sound.

Bent Notes exemplifies consistent, high quality programming. David Moyle started broadcasting his version of the show ten years ago this coming December, and it has been on air every Sunday night since then, with the exception of one or two special JOY events where the team was asked to take a rest. Paul Gardner and Corey Barr joined David shortly after that first show, and together the team has broadcast over 500 shows.

Across the last decade they have taken the initiative to move outside the studio, broadcasting from the Wangaratta Festival of Jazz and Blues across six years, and doing a full program OB last year from the Marysville Jazz and Blues Weekend, in a joint effort with UGFM.

Bent Notes makes the time to train new volunteers, on top of producing a highly organised show. This year they added Jett Mahoney to the team, after she joined the show as a trainee.

Bent Notes is a high-quality, informative and joyful program that showcases the team's combined deep love of jazz and radio. Congratulations to David Moyle, Paul Gardner, Corey Barr and Jett Mahoney for producing a program that others can look to as a benchmark of quality and consistency at JOY.

25 Year Retrospective Exhibition Experience

The exhibition was held near the JOY studios in the Foy's Arcade premises owned by ISPT (Industry Superannuation Property Trust), where a whole floor is devoted to the latest digital display techniques. ISPT partnered with JOY to turn our selection of photos into a vibrant inter-active digital display, presenting JOY in modern technology in an Exhibition Experience. The exhibition presented the JOY story in photographic slideshow and colour video formats, and in an array of documents and ephemera, including photocopies of the original application to the Broadcasting Authority in Canberra seeking our first licence. As an added bonus to visitors, John Oliver, member #1 and founder of JOY, was on hand with other members from the early days, to tell the real stories.

Membership

The annual Radiothon campaign in May attracted 152 new members. Together with our loyal renewing members this brought our numbers to 1990. Although this figure was down 102 from 2018, a trend experienced by many community radio stations, JOY continues to encourage the community to show its support in this special way.

The JOY Funding Working Group continue to examine new strategies to encourage membership.



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Volunteering

JOY is fuelled by almost 300 volunteers, and we value their ongoing commitment and passion. Our volunteers power station activities, and generate a level of expertise that is truly amazing. Over the year we had 73 new volunteers join the team, replacing many who moved on due to work commitments, moved away or retired after many years volunteering.

If we put a dollar value on the work done by our incredible volunteers, a conservative estimate would be \$1.5 million for this year. This is the power volunteer support brings to not-for-profit organisations like ours.

Program Director's Report

The 2018/19 year was a tumultuous one for JOY, but even in difficult times good things can happen, and I am especially proud of the achievements we have made in programming over our 25th year as a station. We saw our audience grow to 589,000 monthly listeners across FM and DAB+, with many more tuning in via streaming.

We sent a team of reporters to Mardi Gras and created a four-hour audio spectacular that is allegedly the most diverse broadcast made in Australia for the year (and possibly ever). Our team interviewed people from all parts of our communities - our youth, our elders, our First Nations people, those with disabilities, parents, politicians and a few stunned tourists - and they did it from the streets, from the marshalling areas and from on top of a float in the parade. A huge thank you to everyone who participated in Mardi Gras and all other parts of our 2019 Pride season, it was a mammoth effort and you rose to the challenge admirably.

Congratulations too to Jason Heath, who received the 2018 CBAA Award for Excellence in Music Presenting for his work with Local Roots. Jason has exemplified JOY's values of inclusiveness and diversity in his work with Local Roots, by becoming a mentor and teacher to a team of young presenters. Where last year you would have heard Jason doing the show solo, now when you tune in you're hearing the next generation presenting Local Roots, with Jason largely behind the scenes. This willingness to step into a mentoring role is what will keep JOY's knowledge alive and humming, and it's an example I hope we can all embrace.

Finally, on a personal note, thank you. I joined the station part way through Pride season this year, and while that was never going to be an easy introduction, the warmth and support I have received from the JOY community has overwhelming. Thank you to everv presenter. producer. panellist podcaster who helps to create our on-air sound. In particular I would like to send a special thanks to my immediate team -Michael Polh our Music Director; John Wintle. our Music Coordinator; Gary Wilson, our News Director; Judy Kelly, our News Coordinator; Fiona Brook, our Interviews Coordinator; Tom Morgan, our previous Program Coordinator; and Rachel Morrison and Con Keramitsis our current Program Coordinators. 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Music Director's Report

'Music produces a kind of pleasure which human nature cannot do without – '(Confucius)

Throughout recent history, our communities have used music to bring pleasure, love and joy to times of sadness, pain and heartbreak. It is with this in mind that we acknowledge the importance of the music we play on JOY to celebrate and remember the past, while looking forward to the future.

Whether it is a big dancefloor anthem or the newest pop hit during your workday in Melbourne's most uplifting music mix, or some adventurous Aussie indie, heart-wrenching soul or queer electronica in our specialist music programming, the pleasures we provide you with are made for every human.

It is a pleasure to craft our musical offerings for you, and we are proud of our ambitious music targets. Programs on JOY are expected to play at least 30% Australian music, surpassing the community radio requirement of 25% local content. As an LGBTI radio station, we also expect to hear at least 15% queer music during our programming. This year, Australian music made up 35% of the scheduled daytime playlist, while music by queer artists was at 22%.

It is a pleasure to have artists chatting about their craft on JOY. Over 200 interviews have taken place across the year, with singers, songwriters, instrumentalists and performers taking the time to share the pleasure music produces. You have heard from big names, like Adam Lambert, Amanda Palmer, Mojo Juju, Samantha Jade, Charli XCX, Hanson, Peking Duk and the Ten Tenors, as well as talented locals, such as CXLOE, Nathan Cavaleri, Sèb Monet, Emily Hatton, Kerryn Fields, Reigan, and Indy Stanton. Thankfully they are all available in our vast podcast library if you missed one!

It is a pleasure to bring musical events to you. Your radio was your ticket to live broadcasts from the Stonnington Jazz Festival, Eurovision in Tel Aviv, and the Wangaratta Festival of Jazz and Blues, among others. We also loved seeing so many JOY members enjoy the awesomeness that is Cher when she was in town.

It is a pleasure to celebrate volunteers who put time and love into what they do. We officially congratulate Jason Heath who, for what he does with Australian music program Local Roots, won a 2018 CBAA Community Radio Award for Excellence in Music Presenting. Massive thanks go to the members of the Music Team, who assist me in my role:

- John Wintle, as Music Co-ordinator, who looks after data entry, playlist creation and the regular APRA reporting like a pro. Without John, I'd be snowed under with admin, paperwork and crashing computers.
- Taryn Walton, as Music Interview Co-ordinator, who leaves us to continue journeying through life.
 Thank you for the massive work you've done over the years to look after such an important part of our station's story.
- Richard Walters, as Music Librarian, who ensures the music we receive ends up in our digital library

We may be a community radio station, but our reach is massive, and our reputation is positive.

JOY Production

This year JOY Production produced 304 campaigns, equating to 45,518 on air spots that ran for a total of 388 hours. Of these campaigns 164 were sponsorship campaigns and 140 were community service announcements and station sound.

In 2018/19 we made a change to how we produce CSA's, favouring organisations that are specifically about and for the diverse LGBTIQA+ communities. This allowed us to better support organisations that are for JOY's audience of interest and also close some of the back doors that allowed potential sponsorship dollars to be grouped into CSA's.

Throughout the year a significant effort was made to achieve a balance of voices to reach parity between traditionally masculine sounding voices and traditionally feminine sounding voices. A noticeable change has occurred that can be heard in the broadcast, with further ground to be covered to reach your goal.

A heavy focus was spent throughout the year on developing the products and services that can be offered by JOY Production outside of the traditional radio sponsorship model. We have developed podcasts and, IVR (interactive voice response) phone trees, and fostered relationships with external podcasters to use (and pay for) our studios for recording. The ground work was laid during 2018/19 and is beginning to yield business in 2019/20.

JOY podcasts saw a strong and consistent year, with a total of 434,114 podcasts downloaded, equating to 1,189 podcasts downloaded every day. We saw growth in the numbers of podcast downloads from overseas with 51.9% of our podcast downloads coming from international users.

The Production Team has been bolstered by the tireless work of Program Imaging Coordinator – Clayton Whimshurst, Ident Coordinator – John Von-Ahlen Podcast Coordinator – Pete Holmes, and Production Assistants – Jordan Johnstone and Sekar Astiari.

Special thanks are in order to our 110+ strong team of dedicated podcasters, who make JOY one of the most robust providers of podcasts in the community radio space.

Training

JOY Training and Technology comes under the Production banner in the 2019/20 financial year, having been under the Operations Manager's structure in 2018/19.

This year, JOY's radio training course saw an uptick in the frequency of training and the number of volunteers trained to be broadcasters. A total of 72 people graduated from the course.
